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#### Special Supplement: COVID-19 News

In light of the continuing daily volume of COVID-19 activity and news, we have summarized <u>COVID-19 news for the week in this special supplement</u>.

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Healthcare regulatory news

CMS <u>proposed</u> decreasing the FY2022 physician fee schedule conversion factor by 3.75% and <u>covering certain additional Medicare telehealth</u> <u>services</u> through 2023.

CMS opened <u>a national coverage determination</u> for the Alzheimer's drug Aduhelm ... FDA approved <u>Bayer's treatment for kidney disease associated</u> with diabetes.

HHS reported 2.1M individuals have enrolled in ACA special enrollment period coverage; Medicaid/CHIP enrollment reached 81M... CMS announced \$15M to help states provide Medicaid beneficiaries with community-based mobile crisis intervention services... HRSA <u>awarded</u> \$144M to HRSA Health Center Program look-alikes (LALs).

OIG reported that the VA <u>underreported EHR modernization project</u> costs by \$2.5B.

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Healthcare law and policy news

President Biden <u>nominated Rahul Gupta</u> as Director of the Office of National Drug Control Policy.

Philip Morris <u>will acquire Vectura Group (\$1.24B)</u>, which specializes in inhaled therapeutics... Eli Lilly <u>will acquire Protomer Technologies</u> (\$1B)... Intelerad Medical Systems will <u>acquire Heart Imaging Technologies</u>... MSP Recovery <u>will go public (\$32.6B) through a SPAC</u>... Microsoft and Teladoc are <u>collaborating on a clinician "unified practice experience"</u>... Digital health funding <u>reached a record \$15B</u> in Q1/Q2 2021.

A federal judge <u>dropped antitrust claims against Eli Lilly, Sanofi, Novo</u> <u>Nordisk, and three PBMs</u> over insulin pricing, but did not dismiss racketeering claims... A Teva subsidiary accused Amicus Therapeutics of <u>failing to provide drug samples</u> in order to prevent generic competition.

Tennessee Department of Health ended vaccine outreach to teenagers.

Senate Democrats announced <u>a \$3.5T budget reconciliation plan</u>, including <u>Medicare dental, hearing, and vision benefits</u>; expanded home/communitybased services; and extension of enhanced ACA subsidies... <u>Drug pricing</u> reforms will likely be used to offset costs... Democrats are also <u>considering</u> options for expanding coverage in Medicaid non-expansion states... Nearly 40 employer/health organizations <u>urged Congress to advance legislation</u> permitting Medicare to negotiate drug prices.

McKinsey reported that telehealth use has <u>stabilized at 38 times higher</u> than pre-pandemic, or 13-17% of visits... <u>JAMA study found that 77.2% of</u> <u>telemedicine visits</u> in the second half of 2020 were for long-term diagnoses, compared to just 2.7% for preventive care.

Lown Institute reported that <u>72% of nonprofit hospitals spent less on charity</u> <u>care/community benefit</u> than they received in tax breaks.

CDC reported <u>93,331 drug overdose deaths in 2020</u>, up from 70,890 in 2019, the largest increase in 50 years.

## We did not publish last week, so here is our summary... in less than 180 Words

President Biden <u>signed an Executive Order</u> to spur competition, including through boosting generics/biosimilars markets; directing FDA to work with states/tribes on prescription drug importation; encouraging FTC to ban "pay for delay" arrangements; recommending closer scrutiny of healthcare/life sciences mergers; and creating standardized health plan options.

Meena Seshamani was named Director of Center for Medicare.

ONC <u>updated EHR data standards</u> to include patient <u>social determinants of</u> <u>health, sexual orientation, and gender identity</u> data.

FDA <u>revised guidance to recommend that the Alzheimer's drug Aduhelm</u> only be used for individuals with mild cognitive impairment or mild dementia... Acting FDA Commissioner Janet Woodcock <u>called for a federal</u> <u>investigation</u> into approval of the drug.

Supreme Court agreed to hear cases on <u>340B payment cuts</u> and <u>DSH</u> payment calculation methodology.

A <u>WSJ analysis</u> found that hospitals often charge cash-paying patients higher prices than negotiated insurer rates... House Oversight Committee reported that the <u>top 14 drug companies spent \$577B on stock buybacks</u> and dividends from 2016-2020.

Moderna is testing a seasonal flu vaccine using mRNA technology.

15 states signed onto a bankruptcy plan for Purdue Pharma.

#### COVID-19 by the Numbers

There are now <u>nearly 34 million confirmed COVID-19 cases</u> in the US, with a death toll over 605,000... The country is <u>now averaging over 25,000 cases/day</u>, more than double the daily rate the week of June 22 (11,300 cases/day); cases are up in 48 states... States with lower vaccination rates reported an <u>average of 6 new daily cases/100,000</u>, compared to 2.2 new daily cases/100,000 in states with higher vaccination rates... A Belgian woman died of COVID-19 after <u>simultaneously contracting two variants of</u> the virus, the first documented dual infection.

335 million COVID-19 <u>vaccine doses have been administered</u> in the US (548,000/day over the past week)... 185 million Americans (<u>65% of Americans 12 and older</u> and 89% of Americans 65 and older) have received at least one dose of a COVID-19 vaccine; 160 million Americans are fully vaccinated (56% of Americans 12 and older)... Axios reported that <u>more than half of unvaccinated Americans</u> live in households that make less than \$50,000 annually, including 22% in households making less than \$25,000 annually.

#### Executive and Administrative Action

CDC indicated that <u>schools should allow students to return to in-person learning this fall</u>, regardless of vaccination status and case rates... CDC and FDA jointly stated that Americans who have been fully vaccinated do not need a vaccine booster "at this time."

The White House will move its <u>COVID-19 Task Force calls with governors</u> from weekly to biweekly.

The Strategic National Stockpile is <u>seeking a company capable of producing 127 million disposable</u> <u>surgical masks</u> over the next year.

#### Healthcare Regulatory News

OSHA extended by 30 days (until August 20) <u>the comment period</u> for its COVID-19 emergency protection standard.

#### Healthcare Law, Business, and Policy News

Seven healthcare professional organizations <u>released a consensus statement</u> recommending that COVID-19 vaccination be a condition of employment for healthcare workers.

The American Healthcare Association and National Center for Assisted Living <u>urged HHS to release the</u> remainder of Provider Relief Funds to help long term care facilities remain financially solvent.

Honeywell and Premier will expand domestic production of exam gloves.

Commonwealth Fund <u>estimated that rapid rollout of COVID-19 vaccines</u> saved 279,000 lives and prevented 1.25 million hospitalizations in the US... A *Lancet* study concluded that the pandemic <u>disrupted routine childhood vaccines for at least 17 million children</u> globally... A *Health Affairs* study found that COVID-19 case rates at nursing homes <u>with the most unique staff members were 92% higher</u> than facilities with fewer staff.

#### Surveillance, Testing, and Treatment

After announcing plans to <u>seek emergency use authorization</u> to distribute its COVID-19 vaccine as a booster shot, Pfizer <u>briefed government officials</u> on the possible need for a booster... US health leaders said <u>more data is needed before regulators can determine</u> whether booster shots will be necessary.

FDA added <u>a warning to Johnson & Johnson's (J&J) COVID-19 vaccine</u> about a <u>risk of Guillain-Barré</u> <u>Syndrome</u>, a rare immune system disorder, in some vaccine recipients... The CDC Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices <u>will meet July 22</u> to discuss the possible risk, as well as boosters for immunocompromised individuals... J&J also reported that its vaccine <u>maintains strong and stable</u> <u>effectiveness</u> against COVID-19 variants, including Delta.

AstraZeneca, J&J, and the University of Oxford are <u>conducting early-stage research on whether modified</u> <u>versions of their COVID-19 vaccines</u> could reduce or eliminate the risk of serious blood clots.

A <u>Lancet study found</u> that BioNTech's vaccine <u>produced 10 times the level of antibodies</u> as compared to the Sinovac vaccine.

Gavi <u>signed advance purchase agreements</u> for 60 million doses of Sinopharm COVID-19 vaccines and 50 million doses of Sinovac COVID-19 vaccines to supply COVAX.

The World Health Organization <u>recommended a combination regimen of corticosteroids</u> with Roche's tocilizumab or Sanofi' sarilumab, two anti-inflammatory monoclonal antibodies, for the treatment of severe or critical COVID-19.
