Special Supplement: COVID-19 News

In light of the continuing daily volume of COVID-19 activity and news, we have summarized COVID-19 news for the week in this special supplement.





Healthcare regulatory news

CMS <u>proposed</u> increasing <u>CY2022</u> acute care hospital pay <u>2.3%</u> (\$10.8B); increasing the maximum penalty for noncompliance with price transparency requirements from \$109,500 to \$2M/hospital; and <u>continuing 340B</u> reimbursement at ASP minus <u>22.5%</u>.

Labor/HHS/Treasury guidance <u>requires insurers to cover HIV pre-exposure prophylaxis (PrEP)</u> without cost-sharing within 60 days.

HHS <u>announced \$103M</u> to address healthcare worker burnout and promote mental health.

CDC reported that a <u>drug-resistant fungus has appeared in small clusters</u> in healthcare settings.

FDA approved Kadmon Pharmaceutical's <u>treatment for chronic graft-versus-host disease</u>... FDA Acting Commissioner Janet Woodcock said the agency has returned to "standard operations" for domestic inspections.





Healthcare law and policy news

Missouri's Supreme Court <u>unanimously ruled</u> that the state's Medicaid expansion could move forward... Arkansas <u>submitted to CMS a revised</u> <u>Medicaid expansion plan</u>... Texas' AG <u>filed a preliminary injunction</u> to block revocation of the state's Medicaid waiver.

FTC voted to <u>reinstate prior approval requirements</u> for merging companies <u>with previous merger settlement agreements</u>.

AmerisourceBergen, Cardinal Health, and McKesson agreed to pay \$21B over 18 years, including \$1.1B to New York, to settle opioid epidemic-related lawsuits, while Johnson & Johnson will pay \$5B over nine years and exit the opioid business... Pfizer agreed to settle (\$345M) with consumers over alleged overpayment for EpiPens... The Justice Department condemned a proposed \$4.5B Purdue Pharma bankruptcy settlement for inappropriately shielding the Sackler family from future opioid lawsuits... Novartis must pay Plexxikon \$178M over infringement of cancer drug patents.

Walmart Health <u>plans to provide virtual care in 37 states</u>... More than a dozen community health <u>centers established a health equity and access coalition</u>... Google announced a <u>Healthcare Data Engine</u>.

An analysis found that only 5.6% of hospitals are fully compliant with price transparency requirements... A <u>JAMA study found</u> that in-hospital mortality among patients treated by women physicians was lower than those treated by men physicians... A <u>JAMA study estimated</u> that Americans' medical debt reached \$140B in 2020... An <u>American Journal of Managed Care study concluded</u> that large self-insured employers often lack the market power to effectively negotiate hospital prices.

CDC estimated that <u>US life expectancy dropped 1.5 years in 2020 to 77.3</u> (Hispanic and Black life expectancy dropped 3.0 and 2.9 years, respectively); COVID-19 drove 73.8% of the decline.

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COVID-19 by the Numbers

There have now been <u>over 34 million confirmed COVID-19 cases</u> in the US, with a death toll over 610,000... Average weekly new COVID-19 cases <u>are up 55% over the past week</u> and increased in 46 states, including more than doubling in Mississippi... CDC reported that the <u>Delta variant accounts for 83% of sequenced cases tallied the week of July 3 across the country</u>, and up to 90% of cases in areas with low vaccination rates.

340 million COVID-19 <u>vaccine doses have been administered</u> in the US (532,000/day over the past week)... 187 million Americans (<u>66% of Americans 12 and older</u> and 89% of Americans 65 and older) have received at least one dose of a COVID-19 vaccine; 162 million Americans are fully vaccinated (57% of Americans 12 and older)... 70% of US active duty service members <u>have received their first dose of the COVID-19 vaccine</u>; 62% of the force is fully vaccinated.

The New York Department of Health <u>reported that 8,700 vaccinated individuals</u> (out of roughly 11 million) have tested positive for COVID-19.

Executive and Administrative Action

CDC Director Rochelle Walensky warned that COVID-19 is <u>becoming a "pandemic of the unvaccinated"</u>... US Surgeon General Vivek Murthy <u>expressed support for reinstating local mask mandates</u>.

The White House <u>directed \$100 million in funding</u> to support vaccine outreach and COVID-19 tracking in rural and heartland states most impacted by the rapidly spreading Delta variant.

HHS announced \$1.6 billion in American Rescue Plan funding to support testing and mitigation measures in high-risk congregate settings, such as prisons and shelters.

Politico reported on <u>USAID challenges in distributing millions of COVID-19 vaccine doses</u> to other countries after \$1 billion in funding was diverted from the effort to purchase 500 million additional doses of Pfizer-BioNTech's vaccine.

The US will send 3.5 million doses of Moderna's COVID-19 vaccine to Argentina.

GAO <u>issued 15 recommendations for federal agencies</u> to improve their response to COVID-19, including urging CDC to improve its testing capabilities and HHS to be more transparent about use of COVID-19 relief funds.

Healthcare Regulatory News

FDA <u>plans to make permanent the device shortage reporting requirements</u> put in place during the pandemic.

Healthcare Law, Business, and Policy News

The <u>American Hospital Association</u> and <u>America's Essential Hospitals</u> separately said they support mandatory COVID-19 vaccinations for healthcare workers.

The American Academy of Pediatrics <u>updated guidance to urge schools to implement universal mask</u> <u>policies</u> for all staff and students older than 2 years of age.

A CBS news poll found that just 48% of "not fully/not vaccinated" Americans were concerned about the Delta variant, compared to 72% of fully vaccinated Americans... An Axios/Ipsos survey found that just one-quarter of unvaccinated adults would even consider getting a vaccine if they could get the vaccine at their doctor's office or were given paid time off.

Surveillance, Testing, and Treatment

FDA will <u>use the priority review process</u> to assess Pfizer-BioNTech's COVID-19 vaccine for full approval in patients ages 16 and older... NIH Director Francis Collins said that the <u>vaccine could receive full approval as early as end of the summer</u>... President Biden said he <u>expects final approval of a COVID-19 vaccine</u> sometime between August and October.

BioNTech and Pfizer <u>signed a letter of intent with Biovac</u> to help with production of their COVID-19 vaccine for distribution in the African Union.

An Israeli study found that Pfizer-BioNTech's COVID-19 vaccine was <a href="https://hisraeli.com

The <u>CDC Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices</u> concluded that the <u>benefits of the Johnson & Johnson COVID-19 vaccine</u> outweigh the risk of Guillain-Barré syndrome in some individuals... The Committee also said that it <u>would not recommend a COVID-19 vaccine booster for people with compromised immune systems unless the FDA determined that one was warranted.</u>

A <u>study found</u> that Johnson & Johnson's COVID-19 vaccine <u>could be less effective</u> against the Delta and Lambda variants.

Novartis plans to deliver 50 million CureVac COVID-19 vaccine doses by the end of the year.

STAT reported that <u>millions of COVID-19 vaccines will likely expire this summer</u> as demand wanes... FDA Acting Commissioner <u>Woodcock said</u> that <u>states should hold onto their doses</u> in case data support extending the expiration dates.

NIH and Children's National Hospital <u>launched a \$40M study</u> to examine long COVID and multi-system inflammatory syndrome in children.
