Also, since we did not publish on July  $8^{th}$ , we've included a brief roundup of significant news from the week of July  $4^{th}$ .



## **Healthcare regulatory news**

CMS released a ten-year framework for health equity.

ONC reported <u>65% of physicians engaged in electronic exchange (sending, receiving, querying) of patient health information</u> in 2019; 75% of those physicians reported quality, patient safety, or efficiency benefits.

CMS approved 1332 reinsurance waiver extensions for Alaska, Oregon, and Minnesota.

FDA issued two <u>warning letters to companies selling unauthorized non-tobacco nicotine e-liquid products</u> and 107 warning letters to companies selling non-tobacco nicotine products to minors.





# Healthcare law and policy news

A <u>district court approved</u> a \$264M settlement over <u>alleged EpiPen price-gouging by Mylan</u>... Teva and Allergan will <u>pay \$54M in cash and overdose reversal drugs</u> to settle a San Francisco opioid epidemic-related lawsuit... Endo is <u>considering filing for bankruptcy</u> without settling opioid-related claims.

Teva <u>asked the Supreme Court</u> to <u>hear a case</u> over use of generic "skinny labels"... Department of Justice (DOJ) <u>joined a whistleblower suit alleging Fresenius</u> performed <u>thousands of unnecessary</u> vascular procedures.

Vertex will acquire ViaCyte (\$320M)... Molina plans to acquire My Choice Wisconsin (\$150M)... Nomi Health acquired Everyone Health and Sano Surgery (\$26.5M)... Rock Health reported US digital health startups raised \$10.3B across 329 deals through the first half of 2022, down from \$15B (384 deals) in the first half of 2021... Optum and Red Ventures formed a consumer health joint venture, RVO Health.

Modern Healthcare analysis found <u>approximately 20M patients had personal/health information breached</u> in the first half of 2022.

Wall Street Journal reported one-in-six calls to the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline, which is transitioning to the "988" dialing code on Saturday, were abandoned/disconnected before reaching a counselor from 2016-2021.

A Mercer survey found 52% of employers will offer virtual behavioral healthcare in 2023.

<u>BMJ</u> and <u>JAMA</u> studies found that patients with darker skin are more likely to receive inaccurate pulse oximeter readings, resulting in them <u>receiving less supplemental oxygen</u> in ICUs than white patients... A <u>Health Affairs study found high-acuity patients</u> were charged, on average, \$1,218 more for cash price facility fees at for-profit emergency departments than at not-for-profit facilities.

The Uniform Law Commission approved <u>model legislation to harmonize telehealth regulation</u>, including licensure, across states.

While overall CPI increased 9.1% year-over-year in June, <u>medical care service prices increased just 4.8%.</u>

## In Case you Missed It: Highlights from the Week of July 4th

— CMS proposed cutting the physician fee schedule conversion factor by 4.4% to \$33.08, adjusting Medicare Shared Savings Program (MSSP) policies, expanding coverage of certain dental services related to covered clinical services, expanding access to mental health services, and implementing the statutory extension of certain telehealth services to 151 days after the end of the COVID-19 public health emergency

- Senate Finance Committee Democrats released an updated prescription drug pricing bill, for possible inclusion in a reconciliation package, including Medicare negotiation of prescription drugs beginning in 2023 (effective in 2026), a \$2,000 Medicare Part D drug cost out-of-pocket cap and other Part D redesign, and Parts B and D inflation rebates; CBO projected the package could cut the deficit by \$287.6B over a decade
- FDA paused its ban on sale of Juul e-cigarettes
- HHS and DOJ negotiated/recovered a record \$5B+ in 2021 healthcare fraud cases.
- A federal judge dismissed claims that AmerisourceBergen, Cardinal, and McKesson <u>caused a public nuisance by shipping millions of opioids</u> to a vulnerable West Virginia community
- AstraZeneca will acquire TeneoTwo (\$1.3B) and Merck is in advanced talks to acquire Seagen



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## COVID-19 by the Numbers

Over 89.2 million COVID-19 cases have been documented in the US, with the death toll exceeding 1.02 million... As of July 13, 2022, the current 7-day moving average of daily new cases (124,048) increased 16% compared with the previous week's 7-day moving average (107,174); the current 7-day moving average of new deaths (351) has increased 13% compared with the previous week's 7-day moving average (312)... The 7-day moving average of hospitalizations with a confirmed case of COVID-19 was 5,775 for the week ending July 11, up 12% from the previous week.

As of July 9, the BA.5 variant <u>accounted for 65% of COVID-19 cases</u>, up from 54% the previous week; the BA.2.12.1 strain, which represented approximately half of cases on June 18, now accounts for just 17% of cases.

More than 12.2 billion COVID-19 vaccine doses have been administered across 184 countries... Over 598 million COVID-19 vaccine doses have been administered in the US... Over 260 million Americans (approximately 83.2% of Americans 5 and older) have received at least one COVID-19 vaccine dose; over 222.4 million Americans are fully vaccinated (71.2% of Americans 5 and older); over 106 million Americans have received a booster or additional dose (just 47.9% of those fully vaccinated)... Approximately 2.67 million children under age 5 have received at least one vaccine dose, out of nearly 20 million eligible recipients.

A White House Council of Economic Advisers analysis found that excess mortality varied significantly across states during the pandemic, <u>ranging from 5.7% above expected deaths in Hawaii to 27.4% in Texas</u>, and was correlated with a state's uninsured rate. Specifically, a 10-percentage point increase in the uninsured rate in 2019 was associated with a 4.8 percentage point increase in excess mortality not directly attributable to COVID-19 during the pandemic.

## **Executive and Administrative Action**

HHS Secretary Xavier Becerra is expected to renew the COVID-19 public health emergency declaration, set to expire today.

The White House COVID-19 Team outlined a strategy for managing the BA.5 subvariant.

During <u>an event</u>, White House Coronavirus Response Coordinator Ashish Jha said the <u>country will not</u> <u>have enough COVID-19 vaccines and tests</u> for the next wave of the pandemic this fall and winter without additional funding from Congress.

Due to rising case numbers and spreading variants, senior Biden Administration officials are <u>considering</u> <u>allowing a second round of COVID-19 booster doses</u> for all adults.

GAO reported CDC's air travel contact tracing system for public health purposes, including COVID-19 spread, needs "substantial improvement."

Department of Labor, CDC, and the Surgeon General are <u>seeking input from employers and others on supporting workers</u> suffering from long COVID.

Updated EEOC guidance states that <u>employers must show that mandatory screening of employees for COVID-19 is "job-related and consistent with business necessity</u>" based on relevant facts such as community transmission levels, vaccination status of employees, and the accuracy and speed of processing tests.

# Healthcare Law, Business, and Policy News

A JAMA study found COVID-19 was the <u>third leading cause of death in the US from March 2020 to</u> October 2021, accounting for one-in-eight deaths.

CDC <u>reported antimicrobial-resistant hospital-onset infections and deaths</u> increased 15% during the first year of the pandemic as antibiotic use increased.

A JAMA study found the share of overdose deaths involving methadone declined from 4.5% in January 2019 to 3.2% in August 2021, likely driven by a pandemic policy allowing certain patients to take their medicine at home rather than under supervision at methadone clinics.

The World Health Organization (WHO) will likely <u>wind down its ACT-Accelerator program</u> this fall to accelerate production of COVID-19 vaccines, diagnostics, and therapeutics.

Wall Street Journal reported on the <u>slow development and lack of focus on therapeutics</u> to address long-COVID and other post-viral illness.

Airfinity estimated 1.1 billion COVID-19 vaccines have been wasted since the start of the pandemic.

Politico reported on <u>developments of a global pandemic preparedness agreement</u>, including <u>a working draft</u>.

WHO and UNICEF data show <u>childhood vaccination rates worldwide dropped to their lowest level in 30 years</u>, driven in part by the pandemic.

## Surveillance, Testing, and Treatment

FDA granted emergency use authorization to Novavax's protein-based COVID-19 vaccine as a two-dose primary series for individuals 18 and older... HHS secured 3.2 million doses of Novavax's COVID-19 vaccine... Novavax plans to provide a COVID-19 vaccine targeting Omicron in the fourth quarter of the year, and expects to have preclinical data in late summer or fall.

FDA granted approval to Pfizer and BioNTech's COVID-19 vaccine for individuals ages 12 to 15.

FDA <u>revised the emergency use authorization</u> for Pfizer's Paxlovid to <u>allow state-licensed pharmacists to</u> prescribe the antiviral.
