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The <u>Biden Administration released a memorandum on countering biological threats and enhancing</u> <u>pandemic preparedness</u>.

The Office of Management and Budget is reviewing the HHS/CMS Interoperability and Prior <u>Authorization Proposed Rule</u> that aims to streamline processes related to prior authorization... <u>CMS</u> <u>will release Medicare Advantage RADV audits conducted from 2011 through 2013</u> to settle a Freedom of Information Act lawsuit filed by Kaiser Health News in 2019.

FDA delayed review of Biogen's ALS drug, Tofersen, by three months.

A <u>Government Accountability Office (GAO) report</u> found HHS' management of the strategic national stockpile needs updating; current stockpiles hold most of the recommended medical supplies, but not in appropriate amounts.

HHS announced a \$15M funding opportunity to address the mental health crisis.



Healthcare law and policy news

U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics data showed the price of health insurance increased 28.2% from September 2021 to September 2022.

A <u>Definitive Healthcare report</u> estimated 333,942 healthcare providers left the workforce in 2021; internal medicine and family practice specialties lost the most providers.

New studies found: (1) <u>enrollment growth in Medicare Advantage plans is projected to surpass 50%</u> by 2025, with inclusion of additional benefits cited as a key driver; (2) in 2021, <u>16.5% of adults</u> skipped, delayed, or used less insulin than needed to save money; (3) <u>life expectancy at birth in</u> neighborhoods with very low opportunity for children was on average 7 years lower than life expectancy in very high opportunity neighborhoods; (4) <u>65% of hospitals have published negotiated</u> <u>rates</u> in machine-readable files.

The <u>U.S. Supreme Court declined to hear cases</u> contesting whether whistleblowers that accuse providers of defrauding the government have to provide details about the alleged false claims... <u>DOJ filed a False Claims lawsuit against CIGNA</u>, alleging the insurer submitted false diagnosis codes to inflate payments.... <u>DOJ has asked CVS</u> for more <u>information on its acquisition of Signify</u>.

<u>GoodRx launched a tool</u> to assist providers in finding affordable solutions for medications they prescribe... The <u>Private Equity Stakeholder Project showed 27 private equity deals in medical</u> <u>staffing</u> during 2021, up from 11 in 2020... <u>Eyenuk raised \$26M in series A funding</u> to expand access to AI eye screening... <u>GSK is partnering with Tempus</u> to improve clinical trial design.

Special Section: COVID-19 and Monkeypox News

A <u>report from the House Select Subcommittee on the Coronavirus Crisis</u> found the Trump Administration attempted to compromise the scientific integrity of CDC communications.

The <u>FDA issued an EUA to Aptitude Medical for Metrix COVID-19</u>, an over-the-counter saliva-based molecular test.

CDC recommended Novavax's monovalent COVID-19 booster for people ages 18 and older.

The <u>CDC's Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) unanimously voted to add</u> <u>COVID vaccines to the Vaccines for Children program</u> that provides free vaccination for Medicaidcovered or uninsured children... <u>ACIP voted unanimously to add COVID-19 vaccines to the</u> <u>agency's recommended immunization schedules</u> for children and adults.

The <u>seven-day average of U.S. monkeypox cases hit the lowest point</u>, 48 cases on October 19, since June 28.
