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## Healthcare regulatory news

CMS released the FY 2025 Inpatient Prospective Payment System (IPPS) proposed rule that would increase the hospital reimbursement rate 2.6%, increase Sickle Cell Disease (SCD) gene therapy cost reimbursement to 75%, and create an incentive payment for small independent hospitals to establish and maintain a buffer stock of essential medicines... the American Hospital Association (AHA) responded that the proposals do not adequately address inflation and expressed concern that it may unduly burden already financially strained hospitals.

The <u>FDA approved expanded use of Enhertu</u> as the first drug to treat solid tumors anywhere in the body for HER2-postive patients, a protein known to accelerate cancer growth.





Healthcare law and policy news

According to a report from the American Society of Health-System Pharmacists (ASHP), active and ongoing drug shortages have reached 323 as of March 2024, the highest since the organization began tracking shortages in 2001; 60% of shortages were of unknown cause or lack of manufacturer reporting.

New KFF data shows over 20M individuals have been disenrolled from Medicaid due to unwinding-related coverage redeterminations; community health centers lost approximately 23% of their Medicaid patients due to redetermination, leading to average revenue loss of \$600K per health center.

A <u>JAMA study</u> found less than half (43%) of cancer drugs that received accelerated FDA approval provided clinical benefit after five years; accelerated approval drugs were also more quickly withdrawn from the market, decreasing over the study period from 9.9 years on the market to 3.6 years.

Anti-obesity drug Wegovy was found to improve symptoms and physical function in patients with obesity-related heart failure and type-2 diabetes in a <a href="New England Journal of Medicine">New England Journal of Medicine</a> (NEJM) study.

The CMS Office of the Actuary (OACT) estimates Alzheimer's treatment <u>Leqembi could cost Medicare approximately \$3.5B</u> in 2024, significantly outpacing market and manufacturer Biogen's projections.

States that relaxed Medicaid coverage policies for Hepatitis C direct-acting-antivirals (DAAs) saw 966 more DAA treatment courses dispensed per 100,000 Medicaid enrollees each quarter than states with no policy changes, according to a JAMA Health Forum study.

Vertex Pharmaceuticals Inc. to acquire Alpine Immune Sciences Inc. (\$4.9B)... Prime Healthcare acquired five New Jersey and California hospitals (\$350M) from real estate investment trust (REIT) Medical Properties Trust.





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
